Winter Reminders from Jeremy Schefers DVM, PhD

As the ground freezes we hope that your crops are harvested and the fields are ready for winter. Yet, there is no rest for the weary and the seasonal work on a dairy farm is not done. Important livestock-specific tasks typically done in fall or winter include:

- 1. Calves: Add calf jackets, increase milk, and/or add supplemental fat to the milk of young calves in hutches and cold housing. Caloric and energy demand increases as temperature falls. If the ground is frozen, calves should have calf jackets and be fed more calories. Generally speaking, for every degree the temperature is below 55 F, a calf needs about 1% more milk/feed.
- 2. Deworming: Fall is an ideal time to deworm cattle and treat for both external (mange mites) and internal (stomach, intestinal) parasites. Pour-on dewormers, such as Cydectin and Eprinex, are approved for lactating cattle and are good for external and internal parasites. Please make sure to give the appropriate dose. Large Holstein cows can weigh over 1,800 lbs. and a full pull of the treatment gun (approximately 1400 lbs.) will only provide 80% of the therapeutic dose for large cows. Under-dosing will not clear the parasite burden and under-dosing is a waste of time and product. For large cows, the treatment gun can be set at 800 or 900 lbs. and pulled twice to achieve a 'killing' dose. A simple way to determine the weight of your cows is to record what cull cows weigh and compare those to herd-mates.
- 3. Proactively prevent pneumonia: If your cattle have had problems with pneumonia, consult your veterinarian and livestock professions to troubleshoot potential causes and re-examine winter ventilation. Fall is also good time to discuss treatment and vaccination protocols. Keeping calves clean and dry with ample amounts of dry bedding will reduce the severity of pneumonia.
- 4. If this is all done, there's always manure to haul, calves to dehorn and castrate, cattle to move, equipment to "winterize," and Christmas decorations to put up.
